PRESENTATION OF THE AFRICAN EDUCATION PACT

AFRICAN EDUCATION PACT

e would like to bring to your attention the African Education Pact finalized at the end of the International Symposium of Kinshasa organized by the International Foundation Religions Societies and hosted by the Catholic University of Congo from November 3 to 6, 2022 in the Democratic Republic of Congo. It was presented to the People of God of Kinshasa on November 6, 2022 during a mass presided over by His Eminence Fridolin Cardinal Ambongo.

This African Education Pact that we are sending you is the result of activities organized by the International Foundation Religions and Societies in different moments : Butare International Symposium I in 2017, *Butare International Symposium II* in 2018, *Maredsous International Symposium* in 2019, *Kigali International Symposium* in 2019 and the *Yaoundé International Symposium* in 2021. These meetings allowed us to reflect on the contribution of the Church, through the Catholic school, to prepare a better future in an Africa ravaged by various crises.

Encouraged and accompanied by His Excellency Bishop Vincenzo Angelo Zani, then Secretary of the Congregation for Catholic Education, we invited all the Episcopal Conferences of Africa and Madagascar to the SECAM meeting from July 25 to August 1, 2022 for a working session at the Catholic University of Congo located in Kinshasa in the Democratic Republic of Congo. We have set ourselves the objective of producing an African Education Pact which we present to you as a contribution to the Global Education Pact. In fact, this **African Education Pact** is intended to be, on the one hand, the fruit of the different meetings mentioned above and, on the other hand, the African appropriation of the **Global Education Pact**. Beatrice Wairu Churu It is nourished by the experiences of pastors and theologians as well as other researchers from universities in Africa, Western Europe, Eastern Europe and Latin America. This **African Education Pact** has been elaborated in the spirit of collegiality, synodality and catholicity. It has four parts: Internal Organization of the Church, Catholic Schools, Governments and Catholic Universities.

On behalf of the International Foundation Religions and Societies, we thank the Congregation for Culture and Education, Cardinals, Archbishops and Bishops, Reverend Fathers, and Professors of various universities for having combined their efforts in a diligent and patient work. The International Foundation Religions and Societies and its partners will continue to bring their expertise to ensure and accompany the implementation of the African Education Pact at the continental, regional, diocesan, parochial, etc. levels.

May this **African Education Pact** translate into an effective dynamic of the new evangelization for the glory of God and the salvation of the African man and woman.

African Education Pact

I. Internal organization of the Church:

- Start from the texts

 of the Magisterium on the Church
 in Africa: *Ecclesia in Africa and Africae munus*;
- Work with all structures related to education in a synodal spirit and be attentive to the issue of diversity;
- 3. Accompany Catholic intellectuals in public and political life;
- 4. Safeguard the place of women in Catholic educational structures
 5. Create/revitalise a/the continental commission on education at SECAM level;

II. Catholic schools

- Emphasize, in each educational institution of the Church, a policy of having a percentage (between 5 and 10%) of children from disadvantaged backgrounds and families benefiting from a scholarship funded by the faithful and the parents of the learners. This internal and ecclesial solidarity is also valid for boarding schools;
- Creating boarding schools is recommended especially in social contexts where financial resources are limited.

- **6**. Establish regional commissions for Catholic education;
- Create or strengthen Catholic education coordination offices at parish, diocesan and national levels;
- Ensure collaboration of competences between episcopal conferences, sharing expertise and human resources;
- **9**. Accompany families in their role in the education of their children.

- Guarantee a synodal management of Catholic schools collaborating together as lay men and women, priests and religious;
- 4. Increase the access of girls to quality education
- Ensure education for Christian citizenship in order to prepare citizens capable of committing themselves to a democratic society and to the common good;

6. Safe place: the Catholic school must be a safe place where children and adults in general, especially the vulnerable, are safeguarded, protected, respected and treated with dignity. It is therefore important to have policies and procedures for safeguarding and protection against abuse of any kind;

III. Governments

- Basing on ancestral values offer educational systems that promote the learning of national languages and an openness to foreign languages, in order to develop the talent of learners according to the needs of society and to form world citizens rooted in their local cultures.
- 2. Organize Commissions for Educational Assessment; this is also valid for the Church.



- Establish and propose a pedagogical project highlighting the values and mission of each educational institution based on Christian principles;
- Introduce or promote education for beauty and interiority;
- Train learners in critical thinking skills to resist all forms of manipulation;
- Introduce and/or strengthen ecological education and encourage ecological practices
- 3. Provide financial and social support to the most disadvantaged families in their mission of education ;
- **4**. Legislatively assure the protection of vulnerable people.
- 5. Be attentive to civil societies (especially those that promote Christian values).
- **6**. Increase the education budget in order to improve the state of infrastructure and the quality of education.
- Ensure the quality of initial and ongoing teacher education and provide teachers with decent salaries;
